# Post Office Play Center

#### **Materials:**

# How to create the play center:

- 1. Collect props listed in the materials section. The local post office has many of these supplies.
- 2. Create letter formats, post cards, stamps, and hours of operation in Microsoft Word. Cut out stamps and post cards beforehand.
- 3. Find a spot in the room with a table and space to play.
- 4. Lay the materials out for students to see and access.
- 5. Tell students only four people in the center at a time.
- 6. Allow each rotation 15 20 minutes of play time to give all students a chance to play if they desire. This worked well on Friday afternoon during our Free Friday time.

#### **Academic Purpose:**

The post office center teaches children about the postal service. This is a service that people provide for others. Children were provided with real-life materials and play materials to enhance learning. Children wrote addresses on envelops to mail the letters. On the wall above the play center, their city, county, state, and nation were displayed to reference during the center. Children wrote letters using correct punctuation, capital letters, and correct spelling with the help of a sheet provided. They could also write the date on the line provided using commas.

### Social/Emotional Development:

- Students are learning communication skills.
- Students are problem solving and communicating with other students in the center.
- Students learn to manage emotions through dramatic play.

#### **Cognitive Development:**

- Children are practicing their writing skills using commas, punctuation, and correct spelling.
- Children use play to practice skills they already know and develop understanding about mail services.

## **Physical Development:**

- Students use fine motor skills while they write letters, work the cash register, and count money.
- Stuffing envelopes helps with hand-eye coordination and dexterity.
- Students develop gross motor skills through walking, carrying packages, and bending over to pick up packages.
